I have diligently studied the New Testament Greek Grammar of the New Testament since I left these institutions and continue to better understand it. I translated the Greek from the New Testament using the 27th edition of the Greek New Testament by Nestle/Aland in 1983. I translated it word by word as it was written so it would be accurate and present the intention of each author.
